Miriam Ben Zeev Hofman (born 1948) got her Ph.D. at The Hebrew University of Jerusalem (1978) and has taught at the Department of Jewish History of the Ben Gurion University of the Negev, Beersheva, from.1979 to 2015. Her research focuses on the history of the Jews in the Hellenistic and Roman periods, with special emphasis on Jewish-Roman relations from cultural, juridical and political perspectives, and on the historical reliability of Josephus Flavius' writings.
