TEACHING

I have been teaching regularly since the summer of 2010. I have developed courses and lectures on international, European, and national migration and asylum law. Additionally, I teach national and comparative constitutional law, focusing on German and Austrian constitutional law, as well as administrative and procedural law. I also offer seminars on a range of topics, including issues of citizenship and belonging, transnational solidarity, and current topics in migration and asylum governance. With experience in teaching interdisciplinary groups of students from various interdisciplinary Master's programs, I am well-equipped to engage with diverse student populations.

In my teaching, I often combine traditional lecture methods, which involve providing knowledge input, with Socratic techniques. While giving input to the students, I strive to engage them by asking questions and collaboratively developing knowledge during classroom discussions. This approach is most effective after small input sessions of about 20 minutes.

Additionally, I incorporate group work based on the inverted classroom model. This method assumes that students come prepared by completing pre-class readings, allowing them to engage in in-class research within groups. This structure promotes cooperative learning, mutual understanding, and encourages reflection on research techniques. Group-based learning also fosters a problem-based and solution-oriented approach, helping students develop essential skills.
